TREE POLICY

As some of you may know, the board of directors passed a policy in June related to the consideration of potential removal, relocation, and trimming of trees and shrubs located in the open space. Grand Teton Property Management received comments and perspectives from a few homeowners in Melody Ranch regarding the new policy. They requested time for further homeowner feedback and comments prior to approving any additional requests. The board reviewed these comments at the last board meeting and agreed to reevaluate certain provisions within the policy. They are currently tabling requests as it relates to this open space policy. LIGHT POLLUTION

What is it? Do you experience it? Can you avoid it? Light pollution is a growing concern worldwide. As a result, there have been numerous groups that have organized a "Dark Sky" movement.

So what is light pollution? It is the brightening of the night sky that inhibits the observation of stars and planets, caused by unpleasant or excessive lights. Many times, this excessive, misdirected or obtrusive artificial light is emitted without realizing it is even a problem. In neighborhoods we can see examples of this light trespass from unshielded exterior light fixtures. Sometimes the direction your light is facing can create the issue. Other times, you simply may have forgotten to turn your outside lights off or the wattage in your bulbs may be excessive. Regardless of the cause, the effect can be harmful not only to the viewing of our beautiful starry night skies, but also to wildlife in our area. Residential areas, with "light pollution" create a continual state of "twilight" in our habitat which affects the mating habits, feeding patterns and navigational skills of birds and mammals in the area.

There are many options available to minimize our light pollution footprint. Look into "friendly sky" lighting options. This may come in the form of a different fixture with a hood or visor on it. The use of timers or motion sensors insures that your lights will go on and off when you need them to. Lights do not need to be bright to be effective. In fact, by dimming or shielding your lights, people can see beyond the point of illumination to see your surroundings. COVENANT CORNER

~ Holiday decorations including Christmas lights, wreaths and garland ... shall be allowed from Thanksgiving Day until February 15th. This is a Tier One, \$25 fine.

~Wildlife Protection. It is recognized by the Association and the purchasers or Owner of any Lot within the Property, that many wildlife species live on or migrate through the Property during various times of the year. Please respect seasonal limitations on use and do not harass the wildlife. This is a Tier Two, \$100 fine.

~ Firewood is to be stored behind a fenced enclosure or "out of sight" from the road and neighboring properties view at all times. This would be considered a Tier One, \$25 fine.
